OBITUARY

MR. M. J. MOLONEY, WEST END, ABBEYFEALE.

The death of Mr. Michael J. Moloney, of the West End, Abbeyfeale, occurred after an illness of some weeks at the fine old age of 96, and removes from the town a well-known and highly respected resident whose affable and cheery courtesy at all times, in his intercourse with the public, will be missed, even outside Limerick and Kerry, where he was so well and creditably known. A leading merchant, whose extensive hardware, provision, hotel and general trading business kept step with progress and development of the town from the early 70's of the last century, and whose efforts at all times aimed at its improvement ranked him as its leading citizen for many years. Generous, broad-minded and possessed of sound judgment in the direction of public affairs and strict probity in the conduct of an extensive trade he was highly esteemed by all classes throughout his long and honourable life. Almost 70 years ago, he helped, unassisted, to restore the local butter market, then the forerunner of the more important fairs and markets subsequently established and since then never failed to give a helping hand to every local and public enterprise that advanced the public good. It is not forgotten that in the great Land League fight of the old days he sheltered fourteen families on his farm at Kileenlea.

An outstanding phase of his long life was his strict observance of the practice of his religious beliefs, for his daily reception of Holy Communion for at least sixty years was not only an example to those amongst whom he lived, but constitutes an enviable record for a layman.

Many expressions of condolence have been tendered to the Rev. John Moloney, P.P., Parteen, and Reverend Mother Mary Madeline, of the Mercy Convent, Newcastle West and the other members of his respected family on the death of their generally regretted parent. The attendance of the general public at the removal of the remains to the Parish Church, and at the Requiem Mass in St. Mary's and the interment, subsequently, in the adjoining cemetery on Monday, was equally large and fully representative of many parishes and towns in Limerick, Kerry and Cork.

**MR. JAMES FITZSIMONS,
FOYNES ISLAND.**

On Sunday morning one of the oldest parishioners in the person of Mr. James Fitzsimons, farmer, Foynes Island, passed to his reward. He is of the seventh generation of Fitzsimmons in Foynes Island. During his eighty-four years he hardly slept three nights on the mainland. In his young days it was nothing unusual to go to Clare for turf, and it is looking like it now that his son "Tom" (who is the ferryman for the wireless and meteorological offices) will have to do the same again if coal keeps so scarce. The late Mr. James Fitzsimons, was always a staunch Nationalist. The funeral coming across the water to the wharf (where the Tri-colour was at half mast) was a very impressive scene. Every available boat was on the river. The remains were placed in the church on Monday evening and at noon the following day the funeral, which was very large, took place to the family burial ground at Knockpatrick. FINANCE ACTS, 1920 and 1921, and ROADS ACT, 1920.

Notice to Owners of Mechanically Propelled Road Vehicles.

The Limerick County Council, in pursuance of the powers vested in them under the Road Vehicles (Registration & Licensing) Order, 1921, made under the Roads Act, 1920, hereby warn owners of mechanically propelled road vehicles which are ordinarily kept within the County of Limerick, that immediate steps should be taken to enforce the payment of all outstanding Licence Duty on same.

Licence Duty can be paid through the post or personally to the undersigned between the hours of 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. with luncheon interval from 1 p.m. to 2 p.m. and on Saturdays between the hours of 10 a.m. and 12.30 p.m., but not later.

In applying for a Declaration Form, on which application for a Licence must be made, the applicant should state the kind of vehicle for which the Licence is required.

Cheques and Postal Orders in payment of Licence Duty should be made payable to "The Limerick County Council" and crossed "Licences: A/c Payees."

Owners of mechanically propelled road vehicles are also hereby notified that the Licence Card shall be carried in the ap-
