ised by such owner to accompany and control such dog.

Offences.

(2)-If a dog between any of the hours between sunset and sunrise is allowed outside the bounds of the premises occupied by the owner of such dog, and such dog is not under the control and in the company of its owner, or some person authorised by such owner to' accompany and control such dog, the owner of the dog and the person (if any) for the time being in charge thereof, and any person causing, directing, or permitting the dog to be outside the premises occupied by the owner of such dog, shall, each in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894.

Seizure of Dogs Where Regulations Are Contravened.

(3)-Any dog in respect of which an offence is being committed against said Order and these regulations may be may be seized and treated as a stray dog under the powers conferred by Section 3 of Dogs Act, 1906. Districts To Which Regulations

Apply. (4) These regulations shall apply to the entire area of the Administrative County of Limerick.

Date of Commencement of Regulations.

(5) These regulations shall take effect and come into operation on the 1st day of March; 1926, provided they have meanwhile been submitted to and confirmed by the Department of Agriculture and Technical Instructor for Ireland. (Signed) JOHN J. QUAID,
