Supt. Mulcahy said there was no objection to the dances as such, but in view of the prevalence of foot-and-mouth disease it was felt it would be desirable that no dances would be held. The applicant had recently been asked not to hold a dance for which he had a licence and he had kindly agreed.

Mr. R. J. Cussen, solr., who appeared for the applicant, said that Castlemahon was not in the affected area and was twelve or fourteen miles from Croagh, where the outbreak occurred.

The Justice said it would be better to wait until the next Court.

Supt. Mulcahy suggested that Mr. Cussen would get in touch with the Department Inspector at Rathkeale and ascertain his views on the matter.

Justice—It would be the best course to adopt. I will adjourn the application to the next Court.
