ANNUAL ESTIMATE.

The Town Clerk submitted his annual estimate and demand for the services of the financial year ending the 31st March, 1942. Revenue was estimated at £1,558 5s. 2d. and expenditure at £1,892 2s. 8d., leaving a deficit of £333 17s. 6d. to be met out of the rates. To meet this sum a rate of 1/8 in the f would be required. This rate, the Town Clerk added, was the same as last year.

The Chairman said that provision was made in the new estimate for a secondary school scholarship scheme and a scheme of free school meals. Were it not for the heavy loss of revenue from tolls owing to the hold up in fairs it would have been possible to reduce the rate to 1/6 in the f. Congratulations were due to the Town Clerk for having kept the rate within the same figure as last year.

"A GREAT BODY."

Mr. McAuliffe-We must congratulate the Town Clerk because in most other towns the rates have been increased. Although the people outside think we are no good I think we are a great body to be able to keep down the rates. Only for the fairs being held up the rates would be down to 1/6.

The Town Clerk said the estimated revenue from tolls was down from £130 last year to £60 this year.

On the proposition of Mr. Mc-Auliffe, seconded by Mr. Clifford, the rate of 1/8 in the f was unanimously adopted.

Mr. McAuliffe proposed that representations be made to the Department of Agriculture with a view to having a fair held in the town as early as possible in June and the proposition was adopted.
