They are marked in blue tracings as follows:—Kilrush, Foynes, Newcastle, Mallow, Tralee, Castle Island, Waterford, Thurles, Kilkenny, Limerick Junction, Bagnalstown, Shilleagh, Rath—Kingscourt and Oldcastle.
