LIMERICK STUDENT ORDAINED

Rev. J. P. Walsh, only son of Mr. James and Mrs. Walsh, Chamber of Commerce, Limerick, was ordained to the priesthood by Most Rev. Dr. Amigo, Archbishop of Southwark, in St. John's Seminary, Womersley, on Saturday.

Father Walsh, who is in his 25th year, received his secondary education in St. Munchin's College, Limerick, and St. Joseph's College, Markcross, Tunbridge Wells. He later passed on to London University, completing his ecclesiastical studies in St. John's Seminary, Southwark Diocese.

As a boy Father Walsh distinguished himself as an Irish dancer, winning many coveted prizes at Irish-Ireland festivals.

HOME ASSISTANCE.

Expenditure on home assistance in the city is remaining more or less stationary. For the five weeks ended 31st May the total outlay was £687 7s. 6d., representing a weekly disbursement of £137 9s. 6d. amongst 797 recipients. The figures for the four weeks ended 26th April were:—Total outlay, £556; weekly disbursements, £139; number relieved, 774. These figures disclose that Limerick, like every other centre of large population, has a more or less regular number of citizens in constant need of assistance.
