### POSITION OF INCUBATOR OWNERS

In the Dail on Tuesday Ald. James Reidy (F.G., Limerick) asked the Minister for Supplies if he can state whether any kerosene oil will be available for incubators in the immediate future.

In reply, the Minister said:—I am informed that, save in exceptional cases, kerosene will not be required for use in connection with incubators in the immediate future. There will be no general release of kerosene to registered incubator owners for some time to come in view of the necessity of conserving the available supplies for essential harvesting operations.
