ARTIFICIAL MANURES.

In reply to a resolution passed by the Committee regarding the provision of fertilisers, a letter was read from the Department stating that this question was receiving constant attention. The prospect of having extra supplies available next year were very poor owing to war conditions.

Mr. McNamara—Prospects for tillage next year are very serious. If manures are not available the position will be very serious.

Chairman—I think we should make up our minds that there will be no fertilisers available next season. We should concentrate in trying to get native artificial manures.

The matter was not further discussed.

LIME SUBSIDY.

The Department wrote stating that the Minister was not prepared to increase the grant of £1,800 provided for the lime subsidy scheme, but as the Committee had a big credit balance the Minister would be prepared to sanction an increased allocation.

The Chairman suggested that an extra allocation of £500 be provided having regard to the big number of applications received for lime.

The Committee unanimously approved of this suggestion.

Mr. O'Donnell—Is there any chance of getting a lime kiln in West Limerick?

Chairman—Except by private enterprise. There is a good market for lime in West Limerick.

Mr. O'Donnell—There is a great need for lime kilns in West Limerick. I hope this important matter will be taken up.
