CINE-VARIETY SHOW

AT SAVOY CINEMA

No less than four national favourites appear in the year's biggest cine-variety show which commences at the Savoy Cinema on Monday next. Spot lighting in the parade is that favourite star of stage, radio and gramophone, Frank O'Donovan. Frank needs no introduction to Limerick audiences as he is an already established favourite there. Few performers have achieved the meteoric rise to fame of this inimitable funster, who, within a few years has become one of the country's best loved stars. Much of Frank's success is due to the many shows, reviews and pantomimes which he both produced, wrote, directed and starred in. His infectious good humour, coupled with his limitless supply of merriment, will be in evidence during his appearance.

In addition to the many uproarious moments of comedy Frank will introduce several of those haunting Irish ballads he helped to popularise, including "Sitting on the Bridge Below the Town." The singing star of the show, however, is Eire O'Reilly, "Queen of Song." This talented vocalist had an international reputation, having appeared in several European capitals. In several countries which she visited prior to the war she gave nationwide broadcast recitals of Irish songs. Prior to her present Irish tour Miss O'Reilly appeared in a number of London West-End revues. In Ireland this glamorous songstress is also well known for her many radio presentations and starring appearances in a number of musical shows. From an extensive repertoire of popular Irish ballads, old-time favourites, operatic gems and tunes of the moment she has selected a well-balanced programme palatable to all.

Philip Dore, celebrated virtuoso of the piano and organ, adds an abundance of merriment in this star-studded parade. Equally as dexterous at the piano as the organ, this famous musician opens with a selection on the former instrument. Light classical pieces provide an introduction to an act which is climaxed with a rollicking selection of well-known airs in which the audiences will be invited to lend vocal support. Interspersed throughout this whirlwind of music, Mr. Dore also presides at the Mighty Organ. As an organist Mr. Dore is well known and his fans are legion. For several years he was resident organist at the Savoy Cinema, Dublin, and few visitors to the city would consider their trip successful unless they heard one of his popular interludes.

Jesson and Farrell, "The King and Queen of Taps," complete the variety portion of the programme with a rhythmic contribution of both tap and lyric novelties. Well-dressed and sophisticatedly presented their act bubbles over with all the newest creations from the international stage and screen. In addition to their concerted work each of the performers take part in solo items with vocal interludes.
