SOLDIERS

DEATH OF MR. J. BARRY

James Nash and Son, House and Land Agents, O'Connell Street. He entered the firm as a boy 66 years ago and gained rapid promotion, having an unbroken period of highly efficient service up to the last. He was held in the highest esteem by all classes and in his business relations was courteous and considerate to a marked degree. A first-class and daring swimmer he won in earlier life both medals and certificates for plucky rescues from drowning. The remains will be removed to St. Munchin's Church this (Friday) evening at 8.15. Requiem Mass will be offered up at 10 o'clock to-morrow (Saturday) and the funeral will take place at 11.30 to Mount St. Lawrence Cemetery.
