U.S.A. AND ICELAND.

The United States is to send 10,000 men of the U.S. Army and Navy to occupy Iceland. Senator Wheeler announced in Washington. "I am fully informed," he said, "that we are about to take over Iceland and send troops, ships and planes there. My information is that the fleet will embark on July 23 or 24."

LINER AND U-BOAT.

A meeting with a big German U-boat in the Atlantic was reported. The Brazilian liner, "Siqueira Campos," 6,456 tons, when she was attacked at Lisbon. The U-boat fired several shots across the liner's bows and made her heave-to and her crew members were summoned on board the submarine, where a German officer examined their papers and then allowed them to return.

TWO DEAD

BARRACK TRAGEDY

Two men were shot at Gibraltar Barracks, yesterday early to-day (says a Press Association telegram), Lance Corporal Joshua N. Cohen, aged 32, and Corporal Harold B. Tolley, aged 30, two Royal Engineers, were killed and dead. It is believed that the men got out of bed, picked up a rifle and shot Tolley, who was sleeping, and that Cohen then turned the rifle on himself. Tolley was buried. Both were Londoners.

WINTER FUEL

INTERESTING LIMERICK SCHEME

Muintir na Tire in Limerick has just issued an appeal to employers and employees in connection with a scheme for the provision of fuel for the winter.

To employers it says:—

"We ask you to arrange for the collection of your employees contributions as set out below, and to add to it your weekly contribution of an equal amount to that of your employees. The amount of contribution to be governed by the salaries and wages bill each week."

To employees it says:—

"We ask you to give each week one penny in the £ of your salary or wages, i.e., if you earn £2 you give twopence, or if you earn £3 you give threepence, and so on."

"In this way," the appeal says, "you will be doing practical Christian work, which will, without doubt, give you a return far greater than the contribution you make.
