### WEEKLY DAIRY MARKET.

Tuesday, July 1st.—The weekly dairy market re-opened to-day, under licence from the Minister for Agriculture, having been closed for a considerable time owing to the foot-and-mouth disease restrictions. There was an exceptionally heavy entry for so late in the season; heifers and dairy cows in about equal numbers, mostly all freshly calved; class was well represented and included some outstanding dairy cows. The attendance was strong and representative, many buyers coming from a distance—a considerable number on the look-out for the best class; this had the effect of infusing a brisk and firm tone in business, which was strong and steady all through for anything with recommendations, demand being a bit extra sharp for the choicer lots; trade was quick and exchange easily effected. All round, the market was marked by a healthy buoyancy and vigour; the right class drew appreciable competition and sold readily; freshly calved dairy cows and promising, coloury heifers being in particular demand and had plenty of buyers. Secondary cows and heifers were also in demand and changed hands. A large volume of business transacted, with a satisfactory wind up, the market being practically cleared. Top price for dairy cows was obtained by Mr. P. Vaughan, Corbally, Limerick, at £28. In-calf and calved heifers, best, £20 to £23 10s.; promising, £17 to £19 10s.; ordinary, £10 to £15 15s.; dairy cows, best, £23 to £28; promising, £17 5s. to £19 10s.; ordinary, £11 to £17.—Wm. B.
