WEEKLY CATTLE AND SHEEP MARKET.

Wednesday, July 2nd. This weekly market re-opened to-day under licence from the Minister for Agriculture, having been closed since Wednesday, March 19th owing to the foot-and-mouth disease restrictions. The number of cattle sent forward for sale constituted a record, all available accommodation being filled. The attendance was exceptionally large and most representative, including many buyers from a distance. A heavy entry of beef and strong cattle; and a fairly useful show of young stores. Class in general was about average. In beef, business active, and steady enquiry; nicely done bullocks and heifers met a firm demand and exchange. A particularly good demand was experienced for heiferish cows and heavy cows, with a free trade at top rates. Strong cattle sold well and wanted, extra choice bullocks in favour; more fat cows could have been sold. Choice young coloury stores of the right stamp were in request, especially dairy heifers. Plain types and backward lots difficult to place. Well bred two-year-old feeders, heifers and bullocks, a ready sale at current rates. Nice yearlings bid for; secondary sorts did not attract attendance. A large volume of business transacted, with a good clearance particularly in the fat cattle section.

Fat bullocks and heifers best £21 5s.-£27 10s.; second run £18-£20. Fat cows best £18-£20 10s.; ordinary £11 10s.-£17 5s. 2½-year-old bullocks and heifers £15 2s. 6d.-£17; second run £11-£15. 1½-year-old heifers and bullocks best £12 10s.-£14 10s.; second run £7 10s.-£11 10s.

Sheep—a heavy entry, all pens filled. The turn-out a useful character, but not many pens of choice mutton. B.g. attendance. Trade opened firm and steady. Well-fed sheep freely bid for; prime wethers easily placed. Full rates paid for finished sheep. Young fresh ewes a fair trade. Buyers showed a favourable business disposition for saleable lots, and were quite willing to part full values. Well-fed hoggets with quality had plenty of buyers. Good small sheep were in favour. Store hoggets, unless fairly forward, quiet. Choice lambs fair demand. Trade well supported with a good finish. Market practically cleared. Fat middle-weight 68/- to 76/-; second run 63/- to 67/-; Hoggets best 61/- to 70/-; second run 48/- to 60/-; Ewes best 55/- to 64/-; second run 42/- to 54/-; Lambs 35/- to 43/-—Wm. B.
