In The Dark!

The public lighting of the town has been suspended for the past week or so with the result that the streets have been left completely in the dark at night. On enquiry it was learned that the arrangement is part of a general policy for all the towns in the county and is intended to help in conserving the supply of electricity for more essential services. So far the interruption of the system has not given much cause for complaint as usually the nights are reasonably bright. It is stated that a reduction will be given for the period during which the lights are being discontinued.

County Home Fuel.

The first consignments of turf under the County Council scheme were delivered at the County Home during the past week or ten days. The peat, which is being delivered in lorries, is described as of good quality and well up to the usual standard of the West Limerick product. A total of approximately five hundred tons is to be delivered to the Institution, in which arrangements are being made to provide suitable accommodation for storage.

L.D.F. Funeral.

Newcastle West L.D.F. group turned out at full strength on Sunday for the funeral of the late Mr. Edmund Cussen, a young member of the force, whose death occurred during the week-end in the early twenties. Deceased, who was a native of Dublin, had been residing for a number of years with his aunt, Miss Cussen, Cullinagh, and had been a member of the L.D.F. since its inception. Members of the force in uniform marched in the cortege under the command of Group Leader Mick Murphy from the local church to Churchtown Cemetery, where the interment took place. A firing party, under Mr. Terry O'Donnell, fired three volleys over the grave and the Last Post was sounded by a uniformed member. The officiating clergy were Rev. M. Quinn, C.C., and Rev. Father O'Grady. There was a very large attendance of the general public.
