### WEEKLY CATTLE AND SHEEP MARKET.

Wednesday, July 16th—Cattle—Increased supply and a better show than last week. The entry included some nice handy weights, both heifers and bullocks, also a good show of cows. Strong attendance of buyers. Beef firm, nice heifers and bullocks met a good selling grade, quick exchange and easily placed at top rates; choice heiferish cows sold well; heavy cows also found favour; buyers operating freely in this department. Stores generally of an ordinary character, well bred feeders enquired for, better trade than last market; best cattle, rather a turn dearer; nicely bred drafts of the right type in steady demand; heifers a preferential trade; plain and thin sorts tedious and uncertain. Business all round worked out satisfactory on even and steady lines. Good clearance. Fat heifers and bullocks, £17 10s. to £21 15s.; fat cows, best, £17 to £20 15s.; second run, £11 to £16; two and a half year old bullocks and heifers, £11 1s. to £15 6s.; one and a half year old bullocks and heifers, best, £9 10s. to £10 15s.; second run, £6 5s. to £9 2s.

**Sheep**—Entries well up to the average, including a good number of pens of choice mutton. Well fed nicely done hoggets and two year old wethers repeated last Wednesday's rates. Useful sheep in demand, and met steady selling trade. Choice pens easily cashed at current rates; plenty of buyers for good mutton, half meat pens slow. Fresh ewes cashed, old ewes quiet demand. Fat lambs a steady trade, recent rates. Store lambs short supply, met a quiet market. All round enquiry well sustained, and trade worked out on the lines of last week. Market practically cleared. Fat middle weight, 62/- to 74/-; hoggets, best, 71/- to 76/-; small, 57/6 to 65/-; stores, 47/6 to 55/-; ewes, 40/- to 54/-; lambs, fat, 37/- to 40/-; stores, 25/- to 30/-.—Wm. B.
