BURIED WITH MILITARY HONOURS

Full military honours were accorded at the funeral of Private Terence Keane (19), Castleconnell, Co. Limerick, who died in Mallow Military Hospital. Deceased was son of Mr. and Mrs. John Keane, Castleconnell. The funeral took place from Mallow to Castleconnell Cemetery, followed by a large crowd of sympathisers. Rev. J. Fogarty, P.P., and Rev. T. Daffey, C.C., officiated.

TWO PEOPLE KILLED

Two people—motor cyclist and a woman passenger—were killed when a British plane, which collided with another in mid-air, crashed on a house and exploded in Lincoln last night. Parts of the machine struck them. A number of other casualties were caused, and property was considerably damaged. Firemen and demolition squads were called out. The pilots of the planes escaped by parachute.

FRENCH ASSASSINATION

Police were reported to be seeking a woman and two men in connection with the assassination of M. Marx Dormoy, former French Socialist Minister, who was killed when a time bomb exploded in his bedroom in the hotel at Montelimar, in unoccupied France, where he was held in compulsory residence.

JAILED AND FINED

At Belfast City Commission on Friday, Jean Larmour, of Lisburn, was sentenced to six months imprisonment and fined £500 for offering bribes to British Army officers in connection with contracts held by her father. When she heard the sentence she collapsed in the dock and was carried away screaming.

SALMON STOLEN

Ballina Railway Station was broken into early on Friday morning and three boxes containing 50 salmon taken away. The value of the salmon taken was £85.

GRANTS IN RESPECT OF SLUM CLEARANCE.

The Secretary explained that in the case of houses in an urban area the Government gave a grant of 66½ per cent. in respect of slum clearance and 33½ per cent. in the case of non-slum clearance schemes. For rural cottages the Government contribution was 60 per cent. of the cost and the difference between the Government contribution and the cost of the houses had to be met by the ratepayers and the tenants. The Government did not direct what rent should be fixed; the Board could do that themselves. They could fix a very reasonable rent for the tenant if they decided to leave the balance on the general rate.
