**MR. JOHN M. O'GRADY,  
RATHKEALE.**

Rathkeale has lost one of its oldest and most esteemed citizens by the death of Mr. John M. O'Grady, merchant, Main Street, who passed away on Monday after an illness of some duration. Deceased, who had reached a fine old age, carried on a very successful business in the town, in which he enjoyed the highest esteem and regard of all sections of the community. A man of many outstanding qualities, deceased possessed a fine personality and his charm of manner won for him the affection of all who enjoyed the pleasure of his acquaintance.

Two sons of the late Mr. O'Grady are in the priesthood—Rev. M. O'Grady, C.C., Newcastle West, and Rev. W. O'Grady, C.C., St. John's, Limerick. Another son, Mr. T. M. O'Grady, L.D.S., carries on the practice of dentist in Dublin. Deceased was throughout life a very devoted and sincere Catholic. He was a Diamond Jubilarian of the Newcastle West Confraternity of the Holy Family, having joined the Sodality while serving his apprenticeship to business in that town over sixty years ago. Last year he was one of about a dozen members of the Confraternity to receive the jubilee medal to commemorate the noteworthy occasion. The sympathy of all sections will be extended to the bereaved family on the loss of a loving and devoted father.

There were striking scenes of public sorrow and regret at the obsequies on Tuesday. There was a very large and representative attendance at the funeral, which took place to St. Mary's Cemetery, Rathkeale, following Solemn Requiem Mass in the local parish church. The church was crowded to capacity for the Mass, at which there was a very large attendance of clergy from all parts of the diocese.

Right Rev. Monsignor Hannan, P.P., V.G., Newcastle West, presided at the Mass, of which Rev. M. O'Grady, C.C., son of the deceased was celebrant. Rev. W. O'Grady, C.C., another son, was deacon; Rev. P. Lynch, C.C., Rathkeale, sub-deacon, and Rev. J. Brazill, Adm., St. John's, master of ceremonies.

The chief mourners were—Mrs. O'Grady (wife), Rev. M. O'Grady, C.C.; Rev. W. O'Grady, C.C., Mr. T. M. O'Grady, L.D.S. (sons); Miss May O'Grady (daughter).
