

The Justice said he would give his decision at the next Court. He understood there had been a decision in a somewhat similar case recently and he would like to have a further opportunity of studying the Acts concerned. No matter how he would decide he felt sure the case would be fought out in the Circuit Court. At the next Court he would decide one case against one of the individual defendants and the case against the B.O.H. The other cases could stand pending the result of an appeal.

EGGS FROM EIRE

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STATEMENT IN HOUSE OF COMMONS

Mr. Henderson Stewart (Lib. Nat., Fife E.) asked the Parliamentary Secretary to the Ministry of Food in the British House of Commons, yesterday, whether steps are taken to check the quality of Irish eggs imported to Britain, and if he was aware that in recent weeks considerable numbers of these eggs distributed in Scotland had been bad.

Major Lloyd George—Eggs imported from Eire are examined on arrival in this country. I am aware that a number of such eggs recently distributed in Scotland have been bad. There have been cases recently where Eire eggs have been packed in boxes made of damp wood, and occasionally eggs so packed deteriorate quickly. An officer of the Ministry is at present visiting Eire to advise on methods of packing and shipment.
