Supt. Dennehy prosecuted, and Mr. D. J. O'Malley, solicitor, appeared for the driver of the vehicle, Thomas Scully, Flagmount, Feakle.

Supt. Dennehy intimated at the outset that he intended applying for

an adjournment after formal evidence was given.

Dr. J. G. Tynan, House Surgeon, Barrington's Hospital, deposed that he performed a post mortem examination of the body of the deceased and found severe injuries to the head and skull. Death, in his opinion, was due to shock and haemorrhage following fracture of the skull.
