ing weather, with sun and wind for a few weeks, would enable the worth some sacrifice in other direclate cuttings to be secured. So far as the ripening and maturing of crops are concerned, August is a vital month. If we will be favoured with sufficient sunshine the harvest is likely to be a bumper one, but should the reverse be the case the outlook will be one of the utmost gravity.

Pig Market.

The live-weight market at Athea on last Monday was on a rather small scale, only about fifty fin-This ished pigs being on offer. dearth of baconers in an which used to be a centre for production is, of course, solely due to the inability of farmers to procure the necessary feeding stuffs. This is a serious state of affairs, and if it continues much longer it is believed that it will put an end to the bacon industry in this country.

Barley Meal.

For years past the point has been stressed that barley meal constitutes an excellent and economic substitute for imported maize. In the vast majority of farmsteads throughout Eire barley can grown with success. In Kerry it has been grown extensively, but in County Limerick some latent prejudice appeared to exist until recently against the cultivation of the crop. Last spring seveexperimental plots were down in the Athea district. results have been so satisfactory that 1941 is likely to witness sowings of barley in an extensive scale all over the area.

## IN U.S.A. SHIPYARDS

The construction of naval and merchant ships for defence is being delayed by strikes in the big shipyards in the Metropolitan area of New York. Over 493,000,000 dollars (£123,000,000) worth of shipping and 18,000 men are involved alone at the Kearny (New Jersey) yards of the Federal Shipbuilding and Dry Dock Co. Smaller yards belonging to the hig Bethlehem Steel Co. have joined in the strike, which variously reported to involve union representation and wage demands. Mediation efforts have been started 6,000 workers have already been ordered to return to work at the Brooklyn yards.
