Before Justice J. M. Flood, B.L., at Ennis Sergeant C. J. Kelleher, of the Garda Siochana, Kilrush, was again charged with obtaining money by false pretences.

Mr. M. J. Walshe, State Solicitor, said the accused was still in hospital and under medical treatment; therefore, he had to apply for a further adjournment.

This statement was confirmed on oath by Supt. J. Dawson, Kilrush, and the Justice remanded the accused in custody until 22nd August.

## LITTLE BOY'S ORDEAL

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### FATHER DROWNED WHILE FISHING

A distressing drowning tragedy occurred on the river Maigue, near Clounanna, on Thursday evening, as a result of which John Fitzgerald (42), a driver employed by the E.S.B. in Limerick, lost his life.

Deceased, who ordinarily resided at Ballyculhane, was on holidays at the time. Accompanied by his eight years old son, who was the only witness of the accident, he went fishing on the Maigue.

Apparently while casting a bait deceased slipped and fell into the water. His little boy immediately ran for help, and Mr. David Punch, who was saving hay in a field nearby, at once dashed to the spot.

Mr. Punch entered the water in an effort to locate the body, but was unsuccessful. The body was not recovered until several hours later.

At an inquest held in Patrickswell on Friday evening by Dr. R. Cleary, coroner, a verdict of death from asphyxia, following accidental drowning, was returned.

Deceased is survived by his wife and eight children, with whom the deepest sympathy is felt in their tragic bereavement.
