exceed half a gallon. As the quantity available for distribution for domestic use is extremely limited, supplies can be made available for use only in premises which are not equipped with gas or electricity. It will accordingly be an offence for the occupier of premises so equipped to register as a domestic user of kerosene.

The maximum amount which may be sold to any occupier of premises is half a gallon per month. The amount available will not at present be sufficient to enable every householder to obtain half a gallon per month, and every retailer is expected to distribute his supplies equitably among domestic users who are registered with him.

Farmers and others whose domestic premises are fitted with gas or electricity, and who accordingly are ineligible for registration as domestic users, but who require supplies for domestic lighting sets or for the lighting of farm buildings and out-offices, may, however, apply to the Department of Supplies for registration as industrial users of kerosene in respect of their requirements for this purpose.

WELCOME NEWS

FOR CITY AND COUNTY

Mr. Laurence O'Donnell, Secretary of Limerick County Council, got official notification to-day from the Minister for Agriculture that all restrictions on fairs and markets in County Limerick and in the Borough of Limerick have been removed.

This means that it will no longer be necessary to apply for permits for the holding of any fairs or markets in the city or county.

DEATH OF ADARE MAN
