TURF PRODUCTION

IN WEST LIMERICK

Turf in large quantities continue to be sent to various parts of Munster from Abbeyfeale Railway Station (writes our Abbeyfeale correspondent). About another thousand tons were dispatched during the past week. It should be noted that the rates already quoted, and which varied from 25/- to 28/- according to quality, represent the amount paid to farmers and others for the turf. The industry has provided much needed employment in the Limerick, Kerry and Cork turbary areas, where the quality of the fuel, for the most part, is of a superior kind. Those who offer turf not sufficiently saved or deficient in quality find it rejected.

SUGAR RATIONING

The Minister for Supplies has issued special notices, which appear in our advertisement columns, for the guidance of wholesale sugar merchants and shopkeepers. The notices inform wholesalers as to the quantity of sugar they may deliver each month to other wholesalers and retailers who were customers of theirs in 1940, and the notices also point out that wholesale sugar merchants and shopkeepers must keep records of all their transactions in sugar on certain prescribed forms.
