LANDLESS MEN

OTHER DAYS RECALLED

The Editor, "Limerick Leader."
Dear Sir,—There was a time, and
so long ago, when a landlord
did not buy pardon by "permis-
sion" to hold "carnival" or the
right to the poor of a few trees
for winter fuel. Having heartlessly
taken to the full the opportunity
made, laws gave them to rob-
bative people of their property.
Now, under changed times,
much that is morally not
justified by an appearance of good
will and deep consideration
for the less well-off of their late
tenants. No doubt, while buying
immunity, it can be judi-
ciously hinted that all present ills
are a natural result of the loss of
our England's kindly laws so
wisely administered by them-
selves.

More than forty years ago, in my
own district of Glin, Co. Lime-
rick, I witnessed the eviction
of many poor tenants by the
landlord. I saw the few
pieces of furniture, beds, etc.,
laid on the roadside on a
winter's day to be destroyed by
the local hired "thugs."
I saw armed police protection, get-
ting on to the thatched roofs to break
in to prevent re-occupation
of the police, specially drafted
for the occasion, had left for their
posts.

During this period also Michael J.
Dore received the full brunt of the
landlord's spite; not for non-pay-
ment of rent, but, as the late
Professor Arthur Cleary, Dean of
Faculty of Law, U.C.D. (himself
a son of evicted tenants from
Adare) said, "by the greatest
able at law I ever experienced."
Michael J. Dore was really evicted
from his own, by his years of advocacy
for the evicted tenants' claims to
their own, he made himself most
obnoxious to the then landlord.

Michael J. Dore is still deprived
of his holding—a holding his
father purchased and for years
a "rack rent" on.

Why may in 1941 be asked? Why
should local landlords, for many
years still holding the local town or
village on their rent roll, have
hundreds of acres of land while
the people, for want of work, must
emigrate or live by charity?
