FLOUR SCARCITY

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POSITION IN WEST LIMERICK

It is now a matter of common knowledge that many poor people in West Limerick and over the Feale in Kerry found it extremely difficult, and in many cases impossible where there were large families, to procure flour (writes our Abbeyfeale correspondent). The irregularity of supplies has been felt at intervals since the 1st of July, but the privation was borne stoically. Later the restricted quotas admitted of the needy persons procuring day to day supplies, which with the advent of the new potato helped to pull them through. The shortage of tea and cigarettes, though keenly felt, had not such a depressing effect as the absence of flour. Recently, however, some flour has been released, but the cost to the poor is necessarily expensive. In West Limerick and adjoining parts of Kerry meal was freely used by the poor, and this failing the percentage of flour allowed for those areas may not have been increased to make up for the lost meal, which should have been taken into account. Conditions are, however, lightened by the demand for turf, which has been saved in large quantities and is now selling at prices never previously realised.

The following prices ruled at Abbeyfeale markets on 18th inst.:—Farmers' butter, 1s. per lb.; eggs, 1s. 10d. per doz.; chickens, 1s. 4d. per lb.; turkeys, 1s. 6d. per lb.; hens, 1s. per lb.; potatoes, 1s. per stone; oats, 3s. 10d. per stone. There is a scarcity of flour, pig meal, and other essentials at present.

MR. PATRICK J. McGRATH, CAHIRNORRY HOUSE, LIMERICK.

The death took place on Monday, 18th inst., of Mr. Patrick J. McGrath, Cahirnorry House, Lime- rick, at an advanced age after a protracted illness.

The deceased was father of Rev. Thomas McGrath, O.M.I., Johannesburg, and Rev. Mother Canice, Convent of Mercy, Doon, and brother of the late Dr. M. McGrath, the Crescent, Limerick. He was for a number of years a member of the Limerick District Council and was one of the founders of Drombanna Creamery, on the committee of which he acted from the start.

In private life he was deeply religious and of a cheerful and kindly disposition. His public life was marked by upright conduct and straightforward dealing. He was always at the call of those requiring his advice or services.

As his life was marked by his strict integrity, so was his death marked by his perfect resignation to the Will of God. He was fortified by the rites of Holy Church and all the circumstances surrounding his death were a source of great consolation to his family.

His passing will leave a blank in the extensive circle in which he moved that will not easily be filled.

The remains were removed to Donoughmore Church on Tuesday evening, where High Mass was celebrated for the repose of his soul on Wednesday.
