in accordance with the Fire Bri- gades Act, 1940. He recommended that the position of Fire Brigade Captain be filled by a man with good mechanical training and who understood the operation of pumps, engines and motors. The report also recommended an arrangement with the Limerick Corporation for dealing with fires in the area adjoining the city.

Mr. J. McCormack proposed that the Board approve the Engineer's recommendation with regard to the appointment of a Fire Brigade Captain, and that the salary be fixed at £4 a week with apartments, fuel and light. It was essential that a capable man be appointed to take charge of the Brigade. With regard to the areas adjoin- ing the city, he moved that the Corporation be paid a nominal fee of £10 for dealing with fires in the Ballinacurra and Ennis Road area. The other areas adjoining the city could be dealt with by the County Brigade.

This proposition was passed and the Engineer's report as amended was then adopted.

Messrs. W. F. Poole and Co. Dublin, whose tender for the supply of a Denis fire engine was accepted by the Board, wrote stating that the application to the British Min- istry of Supply for sanction to the construction of the appliance had been refused. They suggested that the Board point out that the matter was one of extreme national urgency, and that the engine was required for the safety of property in the Limerick district.

The Secretary said he had com- municated with the Minister on the lines suggested and asked the Department to assist the Board in procuring the engine.
