Harvest Weather.

During the past week great progress was made in this district with the harvesting operations. Farmers have availed of every opportunity of reaping, reapers and binders, mowing machines and scythes, doing the work. From local reports to hand it looks that we are having a bumper harvest.

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Scarcity of Flour.

The shortage of flour in this district has caused an awkward position. In plentiful times some families used over 4 stone of flour weekly; now these families must manage with 2 stone, or less. It is hoped that this ration is only temporary, as otherwise it is a serious matter for families who have to depend on 2 stone weekly.

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Recent Death.

The death of Miss Mary McMahon, Knockeraugh, which took place recently, caused a goom over the district. Her demise, coming at an early age, is deeply regretted by all who knew her.

(From Our Correspondent) North Cork Crops.

The wheat crop is satisfactory all round and the yield probably be well up to the average. The process of reaping is now in full swing and with an improvement in the weather for the past eight days much headway has been made during the next few days. Potato gardens have done well and an abundant crop is reported. A majority of farmers, cottiers and allotment holders took due precautions to save their gardens from the blight by spraying with fungicide twice, and have thus reaped the benefit of their labours.

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Tobacco Taken.

A quantity of tobacco valued at about £8 was appropriated from the grocery premises of Messrs. Binchy and Son on Tuesday. The matter was reported to the Gardaí, who were engaged in investigating the larceny on Tuesday afternoon and Wednesday.

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Lighting.

As referred to in last issue the scarcity of kerosene and paraffin envisages a gloomy prospect for the winter. Paraffin is rationed and the monthly allowance of half a gallon is by no means sufficient for domestic requirements. A limited supply of kerosene is obtainable but the price is beyond the paying capacity of the poorer sections of the community. A penny candle costs four pence, while the price of a small wax candle is 6d. In the country districts farmers are considering the feasibility of petitioning the E.S.B. for extension of the Shannon scheme as to enable them to have their homes lighted up during the winter period.

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Pig Market.

Wednesday's market was a small one, only 28 bacon sides were purchased. Quotations—small side, d.w.; 83/- per cwt., 1. 30/- to £3 10s.
