

DAIRY SOCIETY DECREED

at Abbeyfeale Court, before Mr. S. Kenny, B.L., D.J., John Leahy, of Athea, sued the Co-Operative Dairy Society for £6 balance for turf sold at Rocknaboul, Athea, on 20th April. Plaintiff, replying to Mr. M. J. Woulfe, solr., said he sold a rick of turf as it stood to Mr. Downey, the manager, who paid him £5 deposit and left £6 due.

Cross-examined by Mr. MacAulay, solr., witness said he did not weigh it by weight or measurement, as it stood. He did not know how much turf was sold by the ton in April and he never sold it by weight.

Tom Barrett, who was present at the sale, said the turf was sold as it stood in the rick for £11. He did not know how it was sold at the time in April or by the ton. James Downey said that the turf returned 5 tons 13 cwts. from the lorry loads.

Neville, who brought the turf in three lorry loads to Adare, said he observed at the time to the plaintiff that it looked like a rick of mangles instead of turf.

Justice—I am glad I had not to buy any turf myself. Did you find it hollow in the rick?

Witness—No.

Justice—I don't say there was any fraud intended in this, but I am very sure there has been fraud in other transactions. Decree, £6. I certainly would dismiss it if I could.

At the annual licensing session, Supt. Mulcahy said there was no objection to the renewal of publicans' licences or certificates, which were signed, and also exemption certificates. Dance hall licences were also granted for Abbeyfeale, Athea, Tournafulla, Mountcollins, Templeglantine and Kilconlea.
