LIMERICK CENTENARY CELEBRATIONS

The Jesuit Order, founded by St. Ignatius of Loyola, was approved by Pope Paul III on 27th September, 1540. This Society was the first religious Order in the Church to dedicate itself formally by its constitutions to the work of the Mission.

One of the first followers of St. Ignatius was St. Francis Xavier, Apostle of the East and Patron of Foreign Missions. At the present day there are 3,785 Jesuits working in 54 Mission fields among 200,000,000 souls, of whom only 3,000,000 are Christians.

During the past twelve months centenary celebrations have been held throughout Europe. His Holiness the Pope has sent his Papal Blessing and granted a Plenary Indulgence to the faithful who take part in these celebrations.

The concluding celebrations in this country will take place in Limerick at the Sacred Heart Church on Friday, Saturday and Sunday next, September 19th, 20th and 21st.
