WEEKLY CATTLE AND SHEEP MARKET.

Wednesday, October 15th — The offering of cattle was something less than last week. A fair good entry of beef and a useful show of stores to draw from. Large and representative attendance of buyers, both local and shipping. Beef and forward cattle in strong demand, with active inquiry and appreciable competition. Nice fat heifers and bullocks, handy weights, and well-done fresh cows met strong demand and ready exchange; touched top current rates. Good inquiry for strong cattle; forward lots and promising feeders, this class met brisk trade at full current values; rates for best drafts showed a substantial advance on recent markets. In young stores business was brisk; quality and condition commanded ready buyers; bullocks preferential trade. Active enquiry and sharp competition for top lots. Prices as compared with recent quotations were substantially in favour of vendors; no difficulty in cashing the right class. For small cattle and plain types demand was not as buoyant. Generally good demand for all classes to close of day. Proceedings wound up with a strong and satisfactory finish and big turnover. The lifting of the ban on the export of store cattle was responsible for the marked improvement in trade. Fat heifers and bullocks, best, £20 to £23 10s.; second run, £15 5s. to £17; fat cows, £16 5s. to £19 5s.; second run, £10 to £15 5s.; 2½ year old bullocks and heifers, £12 5s. to £15 5s.; 1½ year olds, £11 4s. to £13 7s. 6d.; second run, £8 4s. to £10 1s.; calves, £4 10s. — **Sheep**—A very full entry, slight decrease on last week; a fairly useful selection to draw from. Big attendance. Pens of nice quality mutton met ready demand, at full rates, and easily cashed with competition. Good sheep are wanted. Best hoggets inquired for and sold freely, full rates. A livelier trade and evener demand; top prices easily repeated in owners' favour. Store hoggets, good supply, and better selling trade. Useful fat lambs met strong inquiry and sale; store lambs maintained prices. Young fresh ewes a good trade. Over the day a brisk selling trade, value position easily maintained. Business in this section wound up with a strong finish and early clearance effected. 2 year olds, 60/- to 68/-; hoggets, best, 67/- to 75/-; second run, 60/- to 66/-; stores, best, 52/- to 58/-; second run, 45/- to 51/-; ewes, best, 55/- to 63/-; second run, 40/- to 50/-; lambs, fat, best, 50/- to 57/-; second run, 43/- to 49/-; stores, 32/6 to 40/-.—
