### WEEKLY CATTLE AND SHEEP MARKET.

Wednesday, Nov. 5th.—Cattle—A much heavier market than last week; a record entry. All available accommodation filled. 422 head send forward. Entries were of a mixed class; a plainer show than last Wednesday. Strong attendance of buyers. An increase in fat cattle, for which there was strong demand at late rates, preference being for suitably weighted heifers. Best run of cows readily cashed; forward and aged cattle in strong numbers; quality and condition not up to last week's show; trade opened in this section rather quietly, but later improved substantially, with a better "take" for the choicer drafts of feeders, bullocks meeting a better selling trade than heifers. Previous values about repeated for the nicer selections of well bred and forward lots; others a turn cheaper. One and a half year-old bullocks and heifers drew favourable attention, particularly the tops, and nice "feathery" heifers, suitable for dairy purposes top rates well maintained; secondary and thin cattle hard to negotiate; trade disappointing. Useful cattle got placed at current values. Small entry of calves; no choice lots; quiet trade ruled.

Shipping and local interests represented. Business worked out steadily, with a fair selling trade during the day, and a much heavier volume of business transacted than last week; an exceptionally good clearance.

Fat heifers and bullocks, best, £20 to £24; second run, £15 to £17; 1½ year-old bullocks and heifers, £16 17s. 6d. to £19 10s. 0d.; second run, £13 to £16. Fat cows, best, £17 to £20 5s.; second run, £9 15s. to £16 10s.; 1½ year-olds, best, £11 15s. to £13 15s.; second run, £8 8s. to £11 10s.; calves, £4 1s. to £5.

Sheep—Lesser numbers; a good show of mutton; trade wore a brisker aspect; started firm, and kept going to the end. Prime sheep met a strong demand; made more money, and were quickly placed. Well fed sheep with quality wanted and easily cashed. Young ewes in condition a good selling trade. Small entry of store sheep, which sold well. Nicely done fat lambs a good trade. Full attendance of buyers. All round prices advanced on last week, and full terms had to be paid. Market sold up.
