VERY REV. CANON DUNNE

Deep regret has been occasioned
 by the death of the Very Rev.
 Thomas Canon Dunne, P.P., V.F.,
 who passed away yesterday at the
 Parochial House, Galbally.

The deceased, who was one of the
 most outstanding scholars in the
 Province of Cashel, was parish
 priest of Galbally. For many years
 he occupied the post of Theologian
 on the Chapter of Cashel, and was
 also one of the Synodal judges. The
 late Canon Dunne was a popular
 and esteemed figure in East Lime-
 rick and Tipperary, where he en-
 deared himself to all who had the
 advantage of his devout spiritual
 care.

PREVENT AN EXPLOSION

In addition to the hours of cur-
