Owners of mechanically propelled road vehicles are also hereby notified that the Licence Card shall be carried in the approved pattern holder in the prescribed position on the vehicle at all times when it is being used on a public road.

It is absolutely essential that in the case of motor cars the number of engine and year of manufacture be furnished, and in case of cycles the number of the frame as well as the number of the engine.

Profound regret is generally felt at the death of Mr. Campion, who was for many years back a prominent figure in the business life of Kilmallock. He was widely and deservedly respected, and his straightforwardness was a quality which should and did win the esteem and confidence of all with whom he had even a passing acquaintance. He held strong political convictions, and those who may have differed from him would be glad to admit that his sincerity was unquestionable. It must be up to forty years ago when his name was spoken of with praise and admiration for his prowess on the football field, for he it was who infused new life in the Gaelic code and in company with Larry Roche and other first-class exponents of football brought the old Balbec into the limelight in county, provincial and even as far as All-Ireland championships. His famous "drop kick" went farther afield than that of any other player on the pitch and like all good centre-field men he sent the ball forward with deadly accuracy and it was quite an impossibility to "spoil" his play once he got near his work. Some of his comrades have gone before him and some remain with us yet to mourn his death but they will often recall with pride his feats when they combined to win many victories in the game he loved. CASES AT BALLYNEETY COURT

The larceny of a bicycle and the larceny of a tree were the subjects of charges against defendants at Ballyneety District Justice Kennedy's court. Daniel O'Malley, Daniel Pallasgreen, was charged with the larceny of a bicycle, the property of the Defence.

Supt. Holland prosecuted the case. A Lieutenant stated that he had seen the bicycle in the manoeuvres a bicycle.

Supt. Holland prosecuted the case. Patrick Browne said that the sycamore tree, his property, was growing on the road, was cut down and taken. He valued it at £1.

Defendants admitted the larceny and pleaded guilty.

The Justice imposed a fine on each defendant, and directed them to pay £1 compensation.
