OBITUARY

DR. MAURICE CONNERY, KILFINANE.

Deep and widespread regret has been occasioned throughout the County of Limerick, but especially at Kilfinane, by the death of Dr. Maurice Connery, which occurred at his residence, Spring Lodge, on last Saturday morning. Dr. Connery, who was an extensive and progressive farmer, was one of the oldest practitioners in the county, having graduated with the degrees of M.D. and M.Ch. on the 22nd October, 1884, at the Royal University of Ireland. On the 27th of May, 1885, the degree of M.A.O. was conferred on him also at the Royal University of Ireland. After spending a short term in England, Dr. Connery returned to his native Kilfinane, where he practised up to a short time before his death. He was formerly a member of the Limerick County Council, a Justice of the Peace and for a number of years was Chairman of the Kilfinane Fianna Fail Cumann.

The remains were removed to St. Andrew's Church on Sunday evening, when there was an extremely large concourse of the general public present to pay a fitting tribute of respect to his memory, the funeral on the following day to Darragh Cemetery being one of the largest seen in the district for many years.
