WEEKLY CATTLE AND SHEEP MARKET.

Wednesday, Nov. 19th—Cattle: Entry extra heavy dimensions, numbering just 450 head. Greater proportion of strong and aged cattle. There was a strong attendance and a big "ring"; large supply of beef; preponderance of cows. Trade in this department well up to current prices. The better lots, particularly heifers, met good competition at late rates. Young fresh cows well done easily cashed and ready exchange, strong and aged bullocks sold well, up to £27. In this section good clearance effected. In store cattle section well shaped forward and promising lots found customers, but concession was necessary to effect exchange. Well fed nicely bred young stores found customers on the basis of recent currencies; heifers a better trade than bullocks; secondary and plain types slow and dragging. Trade followed a cautious routine and quieter disposition being manifest. A good clearance over the day's proceedings.

Calves—Small supply, not many good calves on offer; trade active and good enquiry. Fat heifers and bullocks, best £24 to £27; second run, £17 10s. to £19 10s. Fat cows, £17 15s. to £20 15s.; second run, £12 15s. to £17 10s. Two and a half year old bullocks and heifers, £15 to £17 15s.; second run, £12 5s. to £14. One and a half year old bullocks and heifers, best £11 to £13 17s. 6d.; second run, £6 15s. to £10 17s. 6d. Calves, best £5 1s. to £8; second run, £4 to £5.

Sheep—Numbers showed a slight decrease on last week, but again totalled a heavy entry. Good sheep short supply. The larger proportion of the entry comprised pens short of condition and stores. Full company of buyers. Business opened on quieter lines, with a weaker tendency; rates ruling on somewhat lower basis. Well fed pens, both wethers and hoggets, bid for and in demand at present ruling prices; plenty of buyers for good mutton. Fat lambs came in for attention; useful thick sorts with quality freely bid for and sold, except where vendors stood out for too much money. Half meated pens a quiet trade. Ewes hard to negotiate, unless young and fresh. Enquiry for feeding sheep is easing with the advancing season. Useful well bred stores had buyers. Prices showed an easier trend than last week's top rates. Demand for best sheep. Good clearance.

Top price of the day for licensed bull calves went to Mr. Patrick Gleeson, Kyle, Cappamore, and to Mr. Patrick Quinn, Clonpet, Tipperary, at 21½ gas. each, the purchasers being Mr. Jno. Cagney, Tuogh, Adare, and Mr. Jno. Halvey, O'Brien's Bridge. Mr. Denis Rafferty, Longstone, Cullen, was a good second at 19½ gas., the purchaser being Mr. D. M. Sheehan, Templeglantine.
