### WEEKLY CATTLE AND SHEEP MARKET.

Wednesday, December 3rd—Cattle—Entry not as heavy at last week, class hardly as well represented. Average attendance. Beef in steady demand; medium weights readily cashed. Fresh young cows had a free sale. Beef in lots steady demand at full current rates. Useful two and a half year old feeders were bid for. One and a half year olds formed the bulk of the entry; this class met good demand, and were readily cashed, with enquiry more active than last market. Choice young stores, especially bullocks, wanted and readily sold; good selling trade for nice feeders with quality and shapes. Rates on the basis of recent quotations, all useful lots found customers, with steady enquiry for the right description. Calves a shorter entry, colour/heifers showing quality were readily bid for. Full seasonable turnover and clearance. Fat heifers, small, £15 15s. to £20; two and a half year old bullocks and heifers, £14 15s. to £16. Fat cows £14 15s. to £17; second run, £9 to £14. One and a half year old bullocks and heifers, £10 to £12 10s; second run, £8 to £9 18s. Calves, £5 6s. to £7 16s.

Sheep—Shorter supplies, class not up to last week, less good sheep. The entry included a number of moderate sheep in point of quality; prime lots formed a minor percentage, consequently trade not as active at last Wednesday. Pens with quality and nicely done meat ready exchange and good competition; choice sheep freely bid for, in demand and wanted. Less store sheep than last week, met enquiry and sale. Good fat lambs small supply, easier trade. Store lambs slow demand. Fresh young ewes with quality found purchasers. All round rates were somewhat easier than last market. Usual attendance of buyers. Market well cleared. Hoggets, 71/- to 80/-; second run, 60/- to 70/-; ewes, 50/- to 62/6. Lambs, best, 50/- to 56/-; second run, 40/- to 47/-.—Wm. B. Fitt and Co., Auctioneers.

### WEEKLY DAIRY MARKET.

Tuesday, December 2nd—The entry for to-day's market was about the same as last week, there being less heifers and more cows; good average class. The attendance was not quite as large as some of the recent markets, but every man was a buyer and meant business. What was wanted was the "article." This means a great lot and puts much life into trade. Business opened on rather quiet lines as there were a number of secondary heifers on sale which did not appeal to buyers; these were tedious and difficult to place. Nicely bred promising, soft heifers with colour were wanted and bid for and made around current rates. The bulk of the useful heifers changed hands. Choice dairy cows created sharp competition; customers were present, wanting promising cows with the required recommendations for dairy purposes and were quite willing to give best rates and full values. More of this class was looked for. Where quality, condition and promise featured there was no difficulty in exchange at rates around the basis of recent quotations; bids came freely and exchange was ready. Old cows hard to place.
