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HEAVY CONDEMNATIONS.

Over five tons of meat were condemned during November by the City Veterinary Staff as unfit for human consumption. These very heavy condemnations, which were largely due to the presence of tuberculosis in carcasses examined, constitute a record. Close on two thousand beasts were inspected and only four whole carcasses were condemned. Partial condemnations totalled three hundred and forty-two and of that number two-hundred and sixty-seven were found to be affected with tuberculosis. The inspectors made four hundred and thirty-six visits to private slaughter-houses, stalls, shops, etc.
