THE PADDOCKS, LIMERICK. WEEKLY CATTLE AND SHEEP MARKET.

Wednesday, Dec. 10th—Cattle—The entry of cattle showed a substantial increase on last Wednesday, being one of the heaviest for this season, a much better class; more fat and strong cattle, with many useful drafts of nice quality stores. Strong and representative attendance of buyers. Beef met a good selling trade, fat heifers and bullocks handy weights in strong demand, and touched top current rates. Fresh young beef cows steadily placed at full values. Useful store cattle with quality and colour easily negotiated, and changed hands readily, with values on the higher level. Promising young stores were freely bid for, particularly choice 1½ year old bullocks and heifers. Rates for best drafts a turn in favour of vendors, secondary and backward stores met quiet demand, and competition was lukewarm, poor cattle not wanted. Larger entry of calves, choice coloury calves found customers, plainer descriptions tedious. All round business worked out on firm steady lines, with a healthy tone for promising cattle. Good clearance. Fat heifers and bullocks, £18 15s. to £21 10s.; small, £14 15s. to £18 10s.; fat cows, £17 10s. to £19; second run, £12 10s. to £17 5s.; 2½ year olds (small), £16 to £17 5s.; second run, £12 15s. to £15 10s.; 1½ year old heifers and bullocks, best, £11 to £13 2s. 6d.; second run, £8 8s. to £10 15s.; choice calves, £6 15s. to £7 10s.; ordinary, £4 10s. to £5.

Sheep—Shorter entry, but a much better class. Strong attendance of buyers. Steady tone and enquiry for choice pens, including heavy sheep. Well meat and nicely bred hoggets met active competition at advanced rates; brisk bidding for choice mutton, and more could have been sold. Suitable sheep active enquiry, sharp demand and better rates. Fat lambs, short supply, the right stamp easily cashed. Fresh ewes with quality good trade. Business well supported, and market practically cleared. Fat middle weights, 80/- to 97/-; small, 67/6 to 77/-; stores, 55/- to 65/-; ewes, best, 62/- to 71/-; second run, 52/- to 55/-; fat lambs, 50/-; stores, 40/-—Wm. B. Fitt and Co., Auctioneer.

THE PADDOCKS, LIMERICK. WEEKLY DAIRY MARKET.

Tuesday, Dec. 9th—Numerically the entry showed a decrease on last week, average class, not up to the standard of last Tuesday. A few choice cows on offer; strong attendance of buyers. A steady and even trade ruled for the right stamp, which were quickly sold; choice and promising cows and heifers easily changed hands, the supply being hardly up to the demand. This class drew sharp competition and were cashed at full current rates. Nice dairy cows and heifers were wanted; secondary cows and heifers, also old cows, hard to place. All round best rates of last week were hardly maintained. Good clearance. Mr. John McInerney, Rathlahine South, Sixmilebridge, topped the market for a calved cow at £34. Choice cows, £30 to £34; promising, £25 10s. to £27; ordinary, £14 10s. to £19. Incalf heifers, promising, £21 to £24; ordinary, £14 to £20 10s.—Wm. B. Fitt and Co., Auctioneers.
