In the family circle he was a model of fatherly devotion and affection. Suddenly stricken down some months ago with the illness which eventually proved fatal, it was for a time hoped that his robust constitution would pull him through. Less than a year ago he suffered a severe shock following the death of his wife, to whom he had been very deeply attached. However, it was not ordained that he should recover, and despite all the best medical skill and attention could do, he passed to his eternal reward, thus to re-unite with his life partner in whom-apart from his devoted children-his whole happiness had been centred.
