# DROMCOLLOGHER GOSSIP

### Christmastide.

Due to the exigencies of the pre-  
sent emergency period the present

adverse effect, but people have

peace amidst the war-torn world.

### Bad News.

It has been learned from an  
authoritative source during the  
week that the proposed extension  
of the Shannon power to Dromcol-  
logher will have to be abandoned.  
This has come as a great shock  
to the townspeople, who suffered  
in silence in the hope that the pro-  
ject would be undertaken from day  
to day. Shortage of fittings is given  
as the cause of the abandonment,  
and if the matter is indefinitely  
postponed it should be up to the  
townspeople to endeavour to pro-  
vide alternative means.

### Recent Death.

The death took place during the  
week-end of Miss Ellie Feehan,  
formerly of Pike Street, Dromcol-  
logher. A lady of honest and up-  
right character, she was held in  
high esteem by her numerous  
friends, who deeply regret her  
passing. The funeral, which took  
place on Friday, was of very large  
dimensions.

### Minor Hurling Team.

The great victory of the local  
minors in the final of the hurling  
championship gives ready proof of  
the ultimate reward of constant  
effort. The team was first affiliated  
in 1928 and surprised all by their  
sweeping victories to the final,  
where, by a strange coincidence,  
they just failed against Kilfinny by  
a two points margin, snatched in  
the closing minutes of a memor-  
able game. In 1939 they failed  
rather unexpectedly against New-  
castle West in the opening round,  
but in 1940 qualified for the semi-  
final and narrowly went down be-  
fore Newcastle, who subsequently  
became divisional winners.

### Brilliant Display.

It was not, however, until this  
year that the team came really  
into their own and in a series of

### Delegates Thanked.

At the conclusion of the meeting  
the Rev. Chairman, Very Rev.  
Canon McCarthy, thanked the dele-  
gates for their very instructive  
talks, and said he endorsed all that  
they had said. If, hoping alone  
could keep war away, there would

we must do our part and be ready.

## COURT ORDER

### ALTERNATIVE SITES

An offer of alternative sites having  
been made on behalf of the  
Limerick Co. Board of Health, the  
High Court in Dublin ordered that  
a compulsory purchase order in  
respect of two acres at Crossna-  
galla, belonging to Patrick Keogh  
Bohereen, Co. Limerick, be varied  
by the substitution of alternative  
sites.

Mr. Keogh had applied to the  
Court to have made absolute a con-  
ditional order of certiorari, directed  
to the Board, to have the compul-  
sory purchase order quashed, and  
the matter had been allowed to  
stand, with a view to agreement  
being reached about alternative  
sites.
