Remarkable Coincidence.

Poor Russell seems to have been ated to meet his death tragically, or he had an extremely narrow escape from a similar fate last spring, when, while cutting seed potatoes in a hay-barn almost on the exact spot where he died, a section of hay fell on him from the barn, and only that two fellowworkers present at the time were able to extricate him from where he was entombed, he would of a certainty have been suffocated, for when rescued he was gasping for air and suffering from shock.

Estimable Qualities.

Deceased was one of the most inoffensive men in the district. Of a quiet and gentle disposition and industrious habits, he was a most conscientious worker, and was held in the greatest respect and popularity by everybody. Loving God and his neighbour, he lived a decent Christian life, and as Rev.
