## Death of Corporal P. Mackey

The appouncement of the death of Opl. Patrick Mackey, whick took place at Mailow Military Hospital on Wednesday, caused a profound shock, not alone in the city and county, but throughout the length and breadth of the country. The third and of Mr John Mackey, co e, Castleconnell, the deceased, although then in his teens, and just selt school, answered the call in his country's delence, and joined the National Army in 1939.
