Distinguished Limerick Jesuit

Passing of Rev. E. Cahill, S.J.

Wednesday The death took place on morning in a private nursing home of Rev Edward Cabill, s.J. of the Jesuit House of Studies, Miltown Park, Dublin. One of the most widely known priests in the country, Father Cahi I was 73 years of age. He had been in poor health for some time past. Fr Cahill was born in Capping, Jones Limerick, and was ordered in the Jewit Order from Maynooth College in 1897.

After a period of teaching in Mungret College te was appointed Superior of the Apostolic School, and later Rector, which office he held until 1918, when he was transferred to Galway as Minister. In 1918

he was appointed Professor of Ecdesiastical History at Miltown Park, and in 1921 he again filled the office of Superior of the

Apostolic School at Mungret He was appointed Spiritual Instructor at Clon-gowes Wood College in 1923, and from 1924 he was Professor of Ecclesisstical

celebrating the golden jubilee of his prisat hood in June last. In 1929 Fether Cabill founded "An Einghandt" (the Lague of the Kingship of Christ). An Ringhacht was the pioneer of this country of the movement, now wide spread, for the study amongst the laity of Cathelic social prin-ciples and for the effective recognition of these principles in public life. Ev Cabill had a close association with Maintir on Tire and the Clongowes Summer School. He regarded as traged as threatening the existence of the Irish race the drif; of the rural population to the towns and the domination of our sconomic system by external financial interests. His pamphlet "Ireland's Peril," issued in 1930, sounded a grave warning in this connection. His "Freemasonary and the Anti Christian Movement" was published in 1929.
