Child's Sad Death

Evidence At Clare Inquest

Mr J 8 McNeice, solicitor, Deputy City Coroner, with a jury, held an inquest at Barrington's Hospital on Tuesday afterno in touching the circumstances of the death of Anne O'Fiyon (8) who died following

injuries received in an accident at the mill a S.xmilebridge on Friday. Supt Murray, Killaloe, conducted the

State irquiry.

Mr James O'Flynn, managing director of the mills and father of the deceased, gave

evidence of identification.

Wm Frawley said he was employed at the woollen mills. On October 24th he was working in the teasing department at about 4 40 He beard the cries of a child coming from the dyeing room which was the next depertment. He rashed in and saw Anne O'Flyon spinning round on a shaft. The shaft was about 2ft 8in above the heap of wool. He stopped the machinery and found that the child's body and clothing were twisted around the shaft. There was blood on the child's mouth. He was present when Patrick Considine out the child's clothing to remove her from the shaft. The child was then unconscious, but when he took her down she began to call "Mammy." The chi.d was then removed to Barrington's Hospital. It was a younger sister of the deceased who raised the alarm. Witness knew it was usual for the children to go into the dyeing department tooking for oggs.

John Healy, another employee of the firm, gave evidence of work ng in the dyeing room up to about 4 40. He then left and went into the drying room. About ten minutes later he heard a child crying and he entered the dyeing room and saw the

child being taken from the sheft, Sergt Daly, Sixmilebridge, gave evidence that the shaft in the dyeing room was 7ft 6ins from the ground.

De J S Tyoan, house surgeon, Barrington's Hospital, gave evidence that death was due to shork and harmo rhage follow ing multiple injuries received

The jury returned a verdict in accordance with the medical evidence and at ached no

blame to anybody,

The coroner, the foreman of the jury and Supt Murray extended sympathy to the bereaved family.
