We regret to announce the death of Mr. Thomas Collins, which took place at St. John's Hospital on Sunday last, December 28th. The deceased was proprietor of the People's Bakery, 49 Parnell Street, Limerick, where he carried on an extensive business for a long number of years. He was one of the oldest members of the Limerick Bakers' Society and enjoyed the friendship of a large number of the older citizens of Limerick. A man of many admirable qualities, he was deservedly popular amongst all classes, and the funeral, which took place on Monday last to Mount St. Lawrence Cemetery, was large and representative and testified to the esteem in which he and his family are held in the city.
