On accounts showing transactions in excess of 50 in the half-year, 10/6 in respect of each complete 50 or part of 50 transactions, up to a maximum fee of £15 15s. in the half-year.

Bronchial

A PROMISSORY NOTE

To Mr. Bennett—Her husband milked the cows with her. He gave her £10 on a promissory note to come to the place and he wanted to get her out of the place. She went to a solicitor on the 11th Sept. and told him nothing about the assault of the 9th, but she intended to summon him and it was not as a result of the threatened proceedings against Hayes that she issued the summons.

Sarah Curran stated that she lived near Mrs. Oliver and was present on the 9th Sept. when her husband tried to stop Mrs. Oliver from paying Mr. Dooley. He twisted her hand a little bit. Oliver was "excited but not ravenous."

To Mr. Bennett—Oliver took the money from his wife's hand but was not violent.

Mr. Bennett said that he thought the summons against Hayes was proved. As regards the summons against Oliver there may have been a small or technical assault.

NO INDEPENDENT WITNESS

The Justice said that in the summonses Hayes and Oliver v. Hayes there was no independent witness and he would dismiss both. In the summons by Mrs. Oliver against her husband he held that Oliver started the trouble and he had independent evidence of the assault from Mr. Dooley and Mrs. Curran. He proposed a fine of 1/- with 20/- costs.
