### WEEKLY DAIRY MARKET.

Tuesday, January 6th—Considerable increased numbers, average prices. Favourable weather conditions helped, as cows and heifers a "feather" and colour looked for best. Strong enquiry for promising lots, buyers quite willing to pay top values. Choice and promising cows attracted keen competition, no difficulty in placing in class. Spring calving heifers, medium size, and well shaped, with ability, were in good demand and changed hands easily. Over the week's proceedings useful heifers and cows made plenty of money, prices showing a considerable advance on last market; biggest turnover for some weeks, business was brisk and buoyant, winding up with a successful finish and practical clearance. Big attendance of buyers. Patrick Griffen, Tuogh, Adare, headed the market at £35. Excellent selling trade for cows and heifers calved or on the point of calving. Practically all were sold under the hammer, resulting in a record turnover. Mr. J. O'Grady, Derryfadda, Clonlara, headed the market in the dairy cow department at £34, the runner-up being Mr. Michael McCarthy, Caherney, Holycross, at £31, and in the bull heifer department Mr. H. O'B. O'Connell obtained top price at £25. Cows and calved dairy cows, choice, £31 to £34; second run, £25 10s. to £30; others, £24 to £26 10s.; bull, £12 10s. to £19 15s.; incalf calved heifers, best, £22 to £25; second run, £18 to £20; spring calving (small), £14 5s. to £17.
