## IMMUNISATION.

The City Manager, Mr. J. J. Berkery, has issued an official appeal in our columns to parents to avail of the diphtheria immunisation scheme for their children. Many children have received the first injections, but because of the failure of parents to bring their charges to the clinic at the time appointed the treatment could not be completed. A second injection is absolutely necessary and, consequently, parents, who have not already done so, should have their children at the clinic of St. John's Hospital on Thursday morning next at 9.30 o'clock. The Manager has also urged parents to complete registration. This can be done at the Athenaeum Buildings on Monday and Tuesday of each week at 4 o'clock.

## MANUFACTURE OF TENNIS BALLS

For the time being it is not proposed to permit the manufacture of rubber shoes, Wellington footwear, footwear sundries, rubber soles and heels, hot-water bottles, golf balls and tennis balls in Eire. The position regarding tyres for motor vehicles is under examination. The step follows the intensification of war in the East which renders the supply position uncertain.
