PLASSY BRIDGE.

In connection with the proposed
-ervation of the Plassy Bridge,
-Department of Local Govern-
-nt wrote stating that a circular

I am directed by the Minister
-Local Government and Public
-alth to state that attention has
-n called by the Office of Public
-orks to the condition of Plassy
-dge, which connects the Counties
-Clare and Limerick outside
-limerick City. This bridge was
-lt originally for the purposes of
-Shannon navigation, but it is
-w no longer required for the pur-
-se. The Minister has been notified
-t the bridge is used extensively
-people in the Plassy area, and
-o by the citizens of Limerick,
-d it has been suggested that the
-pair and maintenance of the
-dge and the approach paths
-ght be taken over by the local
-thorities interested.

A PUBLIC WALK.

I am, at the same time, to point
-t that if the bridge and paths
-n be considered as being a public
-alk within the meaning of Section
-of the Local Government (Ire-
-nd) Act, 1898, it would be open
-the rural sanitary authorities to
-pport or contribute to the sup-
-rt of the walk under the authority

-n has been received from the
-arliamentary Secretary to the
