and Guard Duff at Rathkeale Garda Station on the same date. Supt. Cooney prosecuted, and Mr. W. Leahy, solicitor, New-castle West, defended.

Guard Walsh said that on the evening of the date in question he saw the defendant walking along the street very unsteadily. Witness kept him under observation and subsequently saw him starting a motor car in front of the Library. When after an extraordinarily long time defendant got behind the wheel witness approached and said he didn't think that he (defendant) was in a fit condition to drive. Defendant then got out of the car and witness turned off the engine. He then brought the defendant to the barracks.

Answering Mr. Leahy, witness said defendant made no objection to going to the barracks and he improved very much on the way.

SERGEANT'S EVIDENCE.

Sergeant Keegan said he asked the defendant to sit down at the barracks but he said he would prefer to remain standing. From his observations witness was satisfied that the defendant was drunk and that he was in such a condition as not to be able to exercise effective control over a motor car. As a result witness decided that a doctor was not necessary but later the defendant asked for a doctor and said he would pay for his services. Witness explained that in his opinion a doctor was not necessary. Defendant then appeared to get vexed and violent, and in spite of witness's advice to keep him quiet he jumped up, snatched his hat, off the table and made a dash to get out of the Garda Station. Guard Duffy, however, caught him at the door and witness told Guard Duffy to place him in the cell. While being put in the cell defendant kicked Guard Duffy in the shin. After some time they got the defendant into the cell but later he said he wanted to get out to the lavatory and they let him out. When he was being put back into the cell he suddenly shot out and caught witness by the throat and forced him back against the wall. Defendant then made a drive for Guard Duffy's legs and tried to throw him but the wall saved him. Eventually after a violent struggle witness and the Guard succeeded in putting the defendant back in the cell. From this on for the next few hours defendant's conduct was like that of a lunatic. Subsequently after about five hours defendant was brought before a Peace Commissioner and discharged on bail.

WITNESS CROSS-EXAMINED.

Replying to Mr. Leahy, witness said that when he first came to the barracks defendant was perfectly quiet. He made out he was sober and asked for a doctor.

Mr. Leahy—Why didn't you send for a doctor when he asked for one and said he was prepared to pay for the doctor's services?—I didn't consider it necessary.

Assuming he had asked for a solicitor or any other aid, legal or otherwise, surely he would have been entitled to it?—Not, in my opinion, in the circumstances of this case. If it were a border line case it would have been different.

In other words, your opinion counts as to whether a man is drunk enough not to have a doctor or sober enough to have a doctor?—These are the instructions.

Mr. Leahy said he had never before heard of such a regulation. They all knew that drunkenness was one of the most difficult questions to decide but in this case defendant was not given an opportunity of disproving the charge as he was entitled to do. That was the cause of his violence.

Sergt. Keegan—I wouldn't agree with that.

Mr. Leahy—He asked for a doctor several times and was refused and it was from that on he became violent.

Guard Duffy corroborated the evidence of the Sergeant, and added that defendant kicked him in the

FAMOUS ATHLETE

DEATH OF MR. T. A. LEAHY

We very much regret to announce the death of Mr. Thomas A. Leahy, auctioneer, Mallow, who passed away on Saturday at the Secours Home, Cork. The deceased was one of the famous athletic family, the Leahy Brothers of the game, County Limerick, being on his day a famous high jumper, his brothers, Con, Paddy, Joe, and Mick. For years back he has been conducting a very successful auctioneering business at Mallow, Charleville and Kilmallock and his clients and the general public he was held in the highest respect and esteem. The late Mr. Leahy it will be recalled, suffered a severe bereavement recently in the death of his wife, who was killed in a motor accident near her home on Christmas Eve.

As stated, Mr. Leahy came from a renowned athletic family and attained international fame as a champion in the leading departments of athletics, and no Irish man could be regarded as a successful issue without the attendance of the Leahy brothers. His death, which occasioned profound and widespread regret, particularly in his native district and in the town of Mallow, where he was held in the highest regard by those with whom he was brought into contact, his geniality, coupled with marked integrity in business transactions, raised him in the esteem and popularity of all sections of the community. Like his brothers, the deceased took a very lively interest in sport, and was a very practical patron of Gaelic events.

Sincere sympathy will be extended to his relatives in this second bereavement within a comparatively brief period.

The remains were removed from the Bon Secours Home to St. Mary's Parish Church, Mallow, yesterday afternoon. Many representative citizens walked with them to the borough boundary, and the cortege included numerous motor cars bearing mourners from several parts of the country. Large numbers met the remains at Mallow. The chief mourners were—The Misses Betty, Mary and Kitty Leahy (daughters); Master Tom Leahy (son); Messrs.
